SUMMER EVENTS

Following the success of last year's day out in Leith, two walk & talk programmes will take place this summer.

■ **WALK & TALK in Ayr** on Thursday 11 June is themed around Edward Bruce 700. A talk in 16th century Loudoun Hall in the morning, will be followed by an afternoon walk around old Ayr led by local historian Tom Barclay.

■ **WALK & TALK in Edinburgh** on Friday 12 June is based on Thomas Muir and the radical movement. Please note the change from the date formerly advertised. This is because of non-availability of a room in St Andrews House on the original date. As well as morning talks on Thomas Muir and his influence on Scottish democracy, there will be a short tour of St Andrews House in the morning, with afternoon walking tours round Edinburgh sites linked to Muir's life and the Scottish Martyrs.

Each event costs £10 for members and £15 for non-members. As places are limited, please book early. Do join us for these informative and interesting days out.

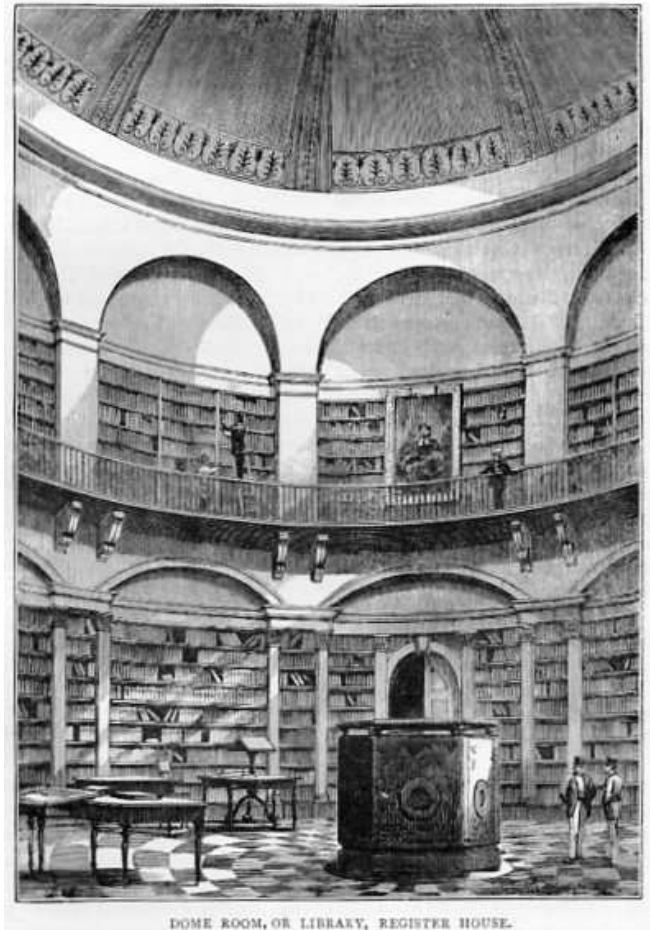

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DOME ROOM, OR LIBRARY, REGISTER HOUSE.

AROUND THE LIBRARIES, ARCHIVES & MUSEUMS

The future of two significant Georgian buildings in Edinburgh is under discussion.

■ A government review has indicated that the *National Records of Scotland* requires new premises to meet modern archival practice, provide storage for future needs, and better facilities for users and staff. It has been recommended that **Register House** (built 1774-88) and **New Register House** (1857-60) would close, and public access and storage facilities would move to Sighthill where Thomas Thomson House is already located. Funding has not yet been allocated for this long-term goal. ■ Another long-discussed project has moved a step nearer. After long negotiations the **Custom House at Leith**, currently storage for the National Museums of Scotland, has been sold to Edinburgh Council. As participants on last year's walking tour of Leith will know, there are hopes to develop a **Leith Museum or Maritime Museum**. The Scottish Historic Buildings Trust is also involved with the project, to help safeguard this notable building for public use.



LOCAL HISTORY WEEK, 7-14 March 2015

■ The **Garden History Society Conservation Trust** has sent the following information about a volunteer project to record historic gardens and landscapes to add to the national database:

"Are you interested in historic gardens and landscapes? Would you like to get involved in researching and recording them?"

If so, we need your interest, enthusiasm and skills and this may be just the volunteering opportunity for you!

We're looking for volunteers to join two newly forming groups in Falkirk and South Lanarkshire regions to research and record historic gardens and designed landscapes. The Garden History Society in Scotland Conservation Trust is launching this two-year project to train, equip and support volunteers to record properties which are not already listed in Historic Scotland's Inventory of Gardens and Designed Landscapes.

You'll receive training in how to:

-research historic maps, online databases and estate archives

-recognise and record features in the field that make up historic gardens and designed landscapes, including significant planted features

- draw together the evidence you uncover into summaries of properties' historical development, for submission to the national online database Canmore.

Each volunteer group will be equipped with cameras, tripods and tablets for on-site recording. A dedicated project officer, based at Northlight Heritage, will provide the training and work with you to research and record the properties.

*We're kicking off the project with **Glorious Gardens**, a training symposium in each area, to be held in March - date and venue to be confirmed very soon. Project funded by Historic Scotland, Clyde and Avon Valley Landscape Partnership and Heritage Lottery Fund."*

■ **Robert Gordon University, Aberdeen**, has been awarded a grant of £50,000 by the Research Councils UK Digital Economy network, for the **CURIOS project** (Cultural Repositories & Information Systems).

"The CURIOS project is about how digital archives can support local interest in local heritage and, in doing so, can contribute to community regeneration and strengthened community cohesion. It will develop software tools to help remote rural communities to collaboratively maintain and present information about their cultural heritage."

Edward Bruce 700

Edward Bruce 700 commemorates Edward Bruce's campaign in Ireland, 1315-18. Fresh from Bannockburn, Edward Bruce, brother of Robert the Bruce, sailed from Ayr to Larne 700 years ago, with the aim of bringing Ireland under one rule and also to open a second front against the English. With complex family connections in Ulster, this enterprise by the Bruces had initial success, before failing, but left a legacy of strong Scottish-Irish links.

Dr William Roulston of the Ulster Historical Foundation will give the morning talk about the campaign, in the historic **Loudoun Hall**, one of the oldest buildings in Ayr and a rare early example of a Scottish townhouse. Built about 1513 for a wealthy merchant, and restored in the mid-20th century by the Marquess of Bute, it is now home to several societies, including the Ayrshire Archaeological and Natural History Society, who are providing the guide for our afternoon walk to sites of historic interest in Ayr.

GETTING THERE Loudoun Hall is in Boat Vennal (KA7 1HX) off either Harbour Street or New Bridge St. near the New Bridge (A719), almost opposite the end of High St.

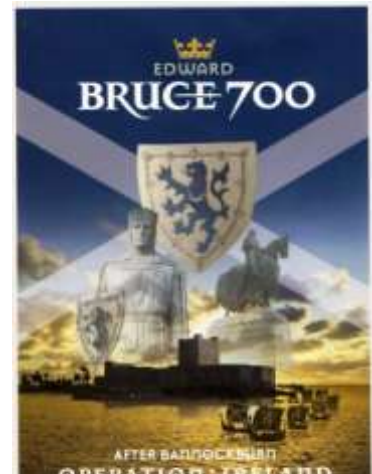
BY RAIL - about 10-15 min walk from the station. On leaving the station turn right, follow Burns Statue Square, then the High St. to the end, cross New Bridge St. at lights, turn right and Boat Vennal is the last alley on your left before the New Bridge.

BY BUS - The Bus Station is even nearer, about 5 mins walk. Larger buses park in Douglas St. outside the Bus Station. Follow Sandgate / New Bridge St. Turn left into Boat Vennal, just after traffic lights to High St (on right) and before the New Bridge.

- 14.00-15.30 • Walking tours of places of relevance to Thomas Muir and the radical movement around the Old Town of Edinburgh led by Eric Graham and David Ritchie.



Attendees should be reasonably active and wear sensible footwear as the tour of the building and the walking tour will involve steps (and cobbles).

St Andrews House is in Regent Road, EH1 3DG (continuation of Waterloo Place, at the east end of Princes Street) about 5-10 minutes walk from Waverley Station and the Bus Station. There is (expensive) on-street parking in Regent Road, Waterloo Place or in St James Centre car park in Leith Street.
