- Calling all Edinburgh storytellers & history lovers help us celebrate Edinburgh's story and shape its legacy! The **William Anderson Memorial Award** for local history writing is back. Edinburgh residents aged 18 years and over are invited to submit an original essay (1,500–2,000 words) exploring the city's rich past, inspired by the themes of Edinburgh 900 from royal connections and faith to innovation, the Enlightenment, and beyond. - The annual review of **Museums Galleries Scotland** is now available: <u>Annual Review 2024-25 Museums Galleries Scotland</u>
- Scotland's People will soon give access to two fascinating new record sets. The Napier Commission returns will arrive in early November, offering a unique window into Highland crofting life in the 1880s. In December over 1,000 maps and plans will also be added, giving new ways to explore Scottish places.
- As part of the **National Library of Scotland** 100th birthday celebrations, selected treasures are travelling to communities around Scotland. Aberdeen Art Gallery's Cowdray Hall concert venue is also marking its centenary in 2025. To celebrate this shared milestone, the National Library's OUTWITH programme kicks off by bringing its earliest publication of Scottish secular music to the Art Gallery. John Forbes' 'Songs and Fancies', published in Aberdeen in 1682, would have been an important guide to students of music at the time. It captured some of the most beloved songs from Renaissance Scotland in print for the first time. This free display in Gallery 15, Aberdeen Art Gallery is accompanied by a series of local events including talks and live music performance: OUTWITH in Aberdeen: 'Songs and Fancies' | National Library of Scotland
- The Spaces, Places and Belonging: Community Hub is a UK-wide programme supporting inclusive, community-led research across the United Kingdom's galleries, libraries, archives, and museums (GLAM)

and heritage sector. The programme is led by <u>The National Archives</u>, in partnership with <u>Leeds Museums & Galleries</u>, the <u>National Library of Wales</u>, and the <u>Community Archives & Heritage Group</u>, with funding from the Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC).

■ The Community Hub provides over £550,000 to be awarded through three grant schemes — Seed Corn Grants, Skills Bursaries, and Project Grants -, alongside a programme of training, digital skills development, and network-building. The Hub will also create a digital platform to share resources, learning, and best practice, ensuring that community engagement becomes a lasting part of our cultural history. Designed to empower communities, particularly those underrepresented in heritage and build confidence across the sector, the Hub is a collaborative, flexible, and sustainable space for innovation and inclusion. #### W ATCH AND LISTEN

- Speed of Light is a documentary from BBC Radio 4 with a focus on photography and its early origins. It features 5 short case studies starting with a photograph of Abraham Lincoln taken only a few weeks before his assassination in 1865. One episode tells the story of William Notman. After emigrating from Scotland to Canada in 1856, he became one of Montreal's most prominent photographers. The programme is presented by Laura Cumming.
- <u>The War Game</u> was produced by the BBC in 1965 and has recently been shown again. It's different from the podcast mentioned last time. It became a ground-breaking classic documentary by Peter Watkins. It's a chilling newsreel style dramatisation of the aftermath of an atomic assault on Britain. It's well worth catching the new introduction from narrator Michael Aspel. There is also a repeat of Mick Jackson's more dramatic, no less harrowing Threads from 1984. It might be best to keep a stiff drink to hand!
- Leading Labour is a podcast which tells the story of each postwar Labour leader. Featuring insights from 60 brilliant insiders and presented and produced by Izzy Conn from the Institute of Historical Research. Explore how Labour leaders managed the greatest political developments of their day both national and international, how they managed the tensions between the different wings of the Labour Party, and how they changed the party to try to win elections and bring Labour into government. <a href="https://tinyurl.com/rwyvs28k">https://tinyurl.com/rwyvs28k</a>

- Archive on 4: Exposing Hiroshima tells the story of one man's determination to set the record straight. Wilfred Burchett's front-page reports from ground zero an international sensation were dismissed by US authorities as 'Japanese propaganda'. - Closer to home is a programme about Sir Alex Ferguson which was first broadcast in March 2022. https://www.bbc.co.uk/sounds/play/m0015tw6
- Elsewhere on BBC iPlayer are several other programmes reflecting the impact of nuclear warfare. A real highlight is a drama from Radio 4 **Hersey's Hiroshima** which is a dramatisation of John Hersey's 1946 account of the bombing of Hiroshima and its aftermath, written after two weeks spent interviewing citizens in the devastated city.
- There are also several programmes marking the 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of VJ day including a special **Antiques Roadshow** and <u>VJ Day 80: the Nation's Tribute</u>.
- <u>VJ Day: We Were There</u> was presented by Rachel Burden and listens to first-hand accounts of the last surviving veterans, many now more than 100 years old. Their stories range from the invasion of British Malaya in 1941 to the horrors of Hiroshima and Japanese surrender in August 1945, while former prisoners of war in Burma recount the brutal treatment they had to endure.
- <u>The Second Map</u> is a BBC History Podcast which is a 3-part documentary also with a focus on the war in Japan and its associated areas. First-hand accounts from those involved, both soldiers and civilians, make this programme riveting and revealing.
- The story of Mags Haney and her controversial life in the Raploch area of Stirling is featured in a series called <u>Crime next Door: the Ballad of Big Mags</u>
- A return to one of our favourites <u>Last Word</u> when in a recent episode the life of Sir Jamie McGrigor, the Conservative Member of the Scottish Parliament for the Highlands and Islands and who introduced a bill to protect tartan was celebrated.
- **Great Lives** is a BBC Radio 4 biography series; It is presented by Matthew Parris and has a brilliant format. A distinguished guest is asked to nominate the person they feel is truly deserving of the title "Great Life". The presenter and a recognised expert (a biographer, family member or fellow practitioner) are on hand to discuss the person's life. A recent episode featured Jock Stein. - <u>Disaster at Sea: the Piper Alpha Story</u> is about the world's worst offshore oil disaster, which occurred on July 6, 1988, when a series of explosions and a massive fire killed 167 out of 226 men on the North Sea oil platform off Aberdeen. The disaster resulted from a chain of failures, including a leak from a condensate pump following maintenance and a failure to communicate crucial safety information, leading to a catastrophic explosion that quickly engulfed the platform. A 3-part series on BBC Scotland chronicles the unfolding story.
- A recent episode of **Digging for Britain** on BBC2 featured Orkney and Shetland. <u>BBC Two Digging for Britain, Series 12, Island Treasures</u>
- PBS America continues to offer some excellent programmes. **Thirties in Colour-Countdown to War** does what it says on the tin. Available on Freesat 156, Freeview 84 and Amazon. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=7XMJKV\_nBpw
- A great radio programme is <u>The Reunion</u> presented by our own Kirsty Wark. There are over 200 programmes to choose from.
- Likewise, Mark Stephen continues to visit various communities across Scotland in the series <u>Our Story</u> with over 70 episodes to choose from a real gem!
- Listen back to **Woman's Hour** and catch the <u>following episode</u>. Who was Scotland's first, largely forgotten, female MP? The Duchess of Atholl had campaigned against votes for women but in 1923 she stood for election herself and won. Her biographer Amy Gray joins Nuala to address the many contradictions of this pioneering politician. In her new book, *Red Duchess: A Rebel in Westminster*, Gray argues that Atholl hasn't received the credit she deserves for championing the welfare of women and children at home and abroad and for challenging the appeasement of Nazi Germany a decision which ended her political career.
- 200 Years of the Railways was one of several programmes celebrating this rich industrial heritage. Michael Portillo shows his great affection for this mode of transport.
- On BBC Radio 4 Extra <u>Thrilling Stories of the Railways</u> is one of several programmes under the theme Railway 200. There are many hours of listening. A favourite of this contributor was <u>How Trains Shrank Time</u> and Space
- Finally on this theme is Radio 3's all day celebration of the birth of the modern Railway. It's called <u>Train</u> <u>Tracks</u>.
- A recurring favourite in this part of Clish-Clash is <u>In our Time</u> presented by Melvyn Bragg. The news is that he is stepping down after 27 years and more than 1000 episodes. Watch this space for news of his replacement.
