Welcome to Issue 61

■ The Forum's 2023 AGM was held on Monday 30 October by Zoom video conference. Unfortunately, the formal Trustees' Annual Report is not yet available, publication having been delayed by the transition from the previous independent examiner (who had retired) to another in the same firm. The meeting heard details of the Forum's activities over the year (previously recorded in *Clish-Clash*) and that the accounts are expected to show a slight deficit of income over expenditure in the year. This was not unexpected and is attributable to general inflationary increases in costs and the fact that the Trustees had agreed to run the Conference at a slight deficit in the hope of attracting more attendees by keeping the registration fee down. Notwithstanding the deficit, it was felt that the state of the Forum's finances didn't merit a subscription increase, and the meeting endorsed the Trustees' recommendation to maintain the current subscription rates for the membership year 2024-25.

Five of the current Trustees did not stand for re-election – Colin Brown, Linda Clark, James Kennedy, Nicola Small, and Nora Solesbury – and the Chair thanked them for their years of service, input and work to the work of the Forum. With no new nominations, the remaining six were re-elected with the exiting officers remaining in post. It was noted that, with only six Trustees remaining, the Forum is perilously close to the minimum number (five) constitutionally required to keep functioning. Two existing Advisory Committee members – Niall Logan of Milngavie Heritage Centre and David Oswald of LOCSCOT – did not stand for re-election. The remaining eight, along with Scott Broadfoot (representing LOCSOT in place of David Oswald) and Dr Lucy Dean (representing the Centre for History, University of Highlands and Islands) were duly elected to represent their respective organisations to the Trustees and help direct the Forum's activities.


Catherine Rice: George Young and the Construction of Strelitz [Perthshire] 1763-4.

- Historic Environment Scotland has received planning permission for Archive House, its project to convert an existing building in the Sherwood Industrial Estate in Bonnyrigg into a new state-of-the-art home for its records and archives. The works are expected to be completed in 2026. It will be the first public building to be designed and built implementing the new Scottish Government Net Zero Public Sector Building Standard in conjunction with Passive House EnerPHit standard. - Historic Environment Scotland Archives acquired the Rosslyn Album in 2021, a collection of drawings, letters and engravings put together by publisher and antiquarian John Britton (1771-1857). The volume has been conserved and digitised, and put on display to the public at John Sinclair House for the first time. HES website reveals that this exhibition presents images from the HES archive collections relating to Rosslyn Chapel and the contents of the album. It is hoped that it will help the viewer learn about the fashion for antiquarianism in Scotland and the lure of Rosslyn Chapel, from the founding of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland to the mass publication of souvenir guides for tourists. Included are sketches by James Drummond, R W Billings and James Skene, photography by Erskine Beveridge and Lady Henrietta Gilmour, architectural records by Reverend John Sime, Sir Robert Rowand Anderson's National Art Survey of Scotland, and 19th-century travel guides to Scotland. WHAT'S ON

■ In Safe Hands: The Battle For Midwifery. Surgeons' Hall Museums, Edinburgh. Until Easter 2024.

This exhibition explores the story of midwifery and obstetrics through the centuries. It explores how the perception of childbirth changed from being simply a life event unto something requiring medical oversight. Traditionally women naturally took on the role of safely delivering a baby, the new 'medicalised' model saw the rise of the male midwife from around the 18th century. SPOTLIGHT ON SLHF ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBER - IAN SHEARER

From 2018 until this month I've been Chairman of the Friends of Kinneil, a small community heritage charity in Bo'ness dedicated to Kinneil House, Museum and Estate, its surrounding area and rich history.

Kinneil has been described as 'the nearest thing you are likely to find to a history theme park anywhere in Scotland: made all the more impressive because it covers 2,000 years' (it includes part of the Roman Antonine Wall World Heritage Site).

It's one of those places where 'local' history sometimes has national or global consequences: not least, James Watt secretly developed his revolutionary prototype steam engine here. In 2019, we played a very active part in national events marking the 250th anniversary of his 1769 patent, and Bicentenary of his death in 1819. SLHF kindly invited me to speak on the subject at this year's conference.

I joined the Friends Committee in 2008, after we moved to Bo'ness, visited Kinneil and were astonished by such a 'hidden gem' with apparently so much potential for greater appreciation. As well as personal interests in history, industry and architecture, my career background at that time was in business representative organisations, and I thought I might be able to help.

One of the greatest privileges has been volunteering as a guide, meeting hundreds of wonderful visitors, and learning from others, as I went along, new skills as well as much more history and its resonance in different ways for such a wide range of people. In 2016 the Friends won a national award for heritage volunteering, in the category of sharing and celebrating. Being Chair has been, to say the least, a 'multi-tasking' role! Despite so many challenges over the last 5 years, our volunteers have persisted with their commitment and enthusiasm. We've engaged and been supported by the community, but have also aimed to reach audiences beyond the local - national organisations such as SLHF, heritage decision-makers and politicians. My predecessors blazed an early trail, which we've tried to follow, in using

social media and in creating informative heritage and news content online. Talks are offered to other local history societies, with follow-up invitations to come on private group visits.

2022-3 has marked Kinneil's centenary as a public park (the Duke of Hamilton began its sale and transfer to the local Council in 1922). It has been welcome to see Kinneil's higher profile marked by a series of positive developments. Last year, it hosted the Baton Relay for the Commonwealth Games (hence the photo!), as well as the SLHF's annual 'Walk & Talk'. This year, Historic Environment Scotland significantly stepped up their operation at Kinneil House, which also had the exceptional honour to welcome His Majesty King Charles III on a visit to meet a range of community organisations in early July. The Friends hope that Kinneil's renaissance will continue over the years to come.



MEET A LOCAL GROUP

CLYDEBANK LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY



Clydebank has a proud industrial past and it was in 1977, after the closure of its major industries - including most of the shipyards and the Singer sewing machine factory - that Clydebank Local History Society was formed, thanks to the energy of a group of Clydebank local historians, led by the late Wallace McIntyre.

We live in an area of West Dunbartonshire which has an outstanding and continuous stream of history. To name just a few details, the area contains a quantity of carved cup and ring markings which are presumably from the Neolithic period; there are Iron Age remains in the area including the site of crannogs, and hill forts. Dumbarton Rock, (a volcanic plug from the Carboniferous period), has a long and eventful history: it was in turn a stronghold of the Damnonii tribe; was prey to Viking siege in the 9th century, and it later housed a royal residence. Old Kilpatrick itself has its own stories about a probable connection with St Patrick: there was a church there from the 12th century, and probably a good deal earlier. The Roman Antonine Wall came through to West Dunbartonshire, ending on the River Clyde at Old Kilpatrick. Clydebank itself came into being with the industrial age - the coming of the shipyards and other huge and thriving industries which continued until the mid-twentieth century.

In the early years, (between 1980 and 1993) the Society brought out an annual journal. This consisted of articles mainly of local historical interest. Many of the authors supplied content from their own local knowledge and experience which was not available elsewhere. For some years, Society members staffed the Clydebank Museum on a voluntary basis. Members have liaised with West Dunbartonshire in creating a series of Heritage walk leaflets.

The Society's stated aims are to create greater awareness of the history, culture and heritage of Clydebank and to encourage the preservation, development and improvement of features of general public amenity and historic interest. The Society actively intervenes when we consider that our local heritage needs protection, or when it feels that it can contribute constructively to plans that include a local history context. We produce a newsletter two-three times per year. The pattern of activities of the Society has remained largely the same over the years. We run a series of ten lectures between October and March on a wide range of topics, not always 'local' history but always of historic interest and in a Scottish context. These are held in a hall on the western side of Clydebank. The membership, which like so many other groups, suffered after Covid, is beginning to increase again: we currently have over thirty members and always welcome additional visitors to our talks. We continue to operate a library of around one hundred local history books which can be loaned to members. We receive regular enquiries from the public through the website, on a great range of topics concerning Clydebank and area, and its inhabitants past and present.


Until Covid in 2020, the Society organised an annual coach outing for members and friends to a place of historical interest – over the past 45 years, we have visited many and varied sites. This ceased during Covid, but we still continue to arrange trips to more local places of interest: 2023 has seen Society members visiting Summerlee Industrial Park at Coatbridge, and the Kelvin Halls Museum Resource Centre in Glasgow.


The Society's current aims are: to resume the annual coach outings for the Society to sites that are further afield, of historic interest. In collaboration with other local heritage groups, to establish a network for mutual enrichment and the sharing of knowledge; to continue with an interest in local issues concerned with local history.
