

## UNIVERSITIES

Face to face: stories from the Asylum is a touring exhibition based on the lives of a small group of patients admitted to Dundee Royal Lunatic Asylum between 1886 and 1902. Using information and photographs from their case notes, the exhibition examines the circumstances which led to their committal to the asylum, the dilemmas faced by their families, and the nature of their mental illness. This exhibition is part of the Promoting Mental Health through the Lessons of History project, based at the University of St Andrews, and is a collaboration with University of Dundee Archive Services. ■ From water to steam: the transition from renewable energy to coal during Scotland's industrial revolution is the title of a new PhD project supervised by Dr Simon Naylor and Professor Paul Bishop, University of Glasgow;

The studentship is in collaboration with Historic Environment Scotland (HES) and the National Library of Scotland (NLS), and makes use of their collections, for example using the Ordnance Survey's 1<sup>st</sup> and 2nd edition maps to document locations and changing distributions of mills. Dr Miles Oglethorpe, Head of Industrial Heritage at HES; and Christopher Fleet, Senior Map Curator at NLS are providing their expertise. The award is made by the Scottish Cultural Heritage Consortium (SCHC), which is part of the Arts and Humanities Research Council's Collaborative Doctoral Partnership scheme. Beginning in October 2018 the 3-year PhD is supplemented by a 6-month studentship which will create a publicly available website.

This PhD research project is at Aberdeen University and will undertake a study of the slave trade and slavery collections in the National Library of Scotland.

It starts in October 2018 and lasts for 3 years, with supervision by Dr Catherine Jones and Professor Patience Schell at the University of Aberdeen, and by Dr Ralph McLean and Mr Robert Betteridge at the National Library of Scotland.

■ Poverty, health, diet and education in Glasgow: from domestic science to the allied health professions, 1875-1933, is a project by Glasgow Caledonian University Archives, to sort, catalogue, preserve and share the collections of the Glasgow School of Cookery (1875) and the West End School of Cookery (1878), amalgamated in 1908 to form the Glasgow and West of Scotland College of Domestic Science, later renamed Queen's College Glasgow, which merged in 1993 with Glasgow Polytechnic to become Glasgow Caledonian University. Is based on a survey of Scottish hospitals in 1989-90 funded by a grant from the Scottish Research Council. This resulted in an unpublished gazetteer and formed the basis of a short book, published by Historic Scotland in 2010 entitled **Building up your** *Health.* available free as a PDF:
