© SLHF 2014 ISSN 2055-6411 ■ Seeing our history is a 12-month project to explore what it was like to be blind or partially sighted in Edwardian Edinburgh and Lothians. Sight loss charity RNIB Scotland has received £55,700 from the Heritage Lottery Fund, for the project, which aims to bring to life the stories of people with sight loss in Edinburgh and the Lothians, and will offer a unique but often grim glimpse of a time when the blind and partially sighted were consigned to the margins of society, almost wholly dependent on the good will of others.

The aim is to compile a 60-page booklet - in hard copy, braille and 'talking-book' formats - to accompany a series of six programmes to be broadcast on the charity's Insight Radio station.

The project will base its work on the 1903-10 register of 'the outdoor blind' (ie, those not resident in institutions) recently donated by RNIB Scotland to the Lothian Health Services Archive. Details include names, address, place of birth, age when sight was lost, cause of blindness; marital status; how employed; weekly earnings before losing sight and weekly income after, and date of death.

The 1,170 entries in the register will be supplemented by other materials such as census returns, poor relief records, and family papers and wills for the wealthy to enable the project to reconstruct some of the stories of blind and partially sighted people's lives across social class, gender, occupation, and locality.

■ Hugh Miller & the Cruise of the Betsey Gilbert writes: The Royal Scottish Geographical Society and Friends of Hugh Miller have chartered a beautiful old sailing boat Leader, to follow part of the journey taken by Hugh Miller on The Betsey in 1844. This is a modestly funded project, but has created quite a dynamic over the past year, because so many creative people and organisations have pledged their support. The journey will take place from 6th-12th September 2014, and has associated community events in Cromarty and on Eigg. We have also produced linked educational resources for primary and secondary pupils which will be piloted in September & October.

There may still be a few places on Eigg from 7th -11th September. based at the Glebe Barn http://glebebarn.co.uk/. This is being organised by Angus Miller of the Scottish Geodiversity Forum. The cost is around £250 which covers full board. We have applied for some support funding so it could be less than this. (A small amount of extra funding will allow a group of Higher dance pupils to travel to Eigg from Musselburgh, to perform a piece they have created about Hugh Miller, on the famous Singing Sands).

The programme on Eigg will be quite flexible with folks opting to join what's on offer or simply doing their own thing. I hope Team Betsey be able to join Team Eigg. For further information see the website http://cruiseofthebetsey.wordpress.com/

- **Scotland's People** has announced improvements and additions to their website:
- 1) A further 1861 Census enumeration book has been indexed and is now available to search. 15 pages for the Milton, Glasgow area have been made available.
- 2) Over 44,000 indexes for all census years have been updated. So if you believe a name may have been miss-recorded, then you can try searching the new refreshed index.
- 3) A new feature for viewing multi-page records (Wills & Testaments, Soldiers' Wills, and Coats of Arms) now allows you to download all pages as a PDF document. Larger documents, particularly the Wills & Testaments, which can be up to 40 pages, can be viewed, saved and printed as a single document. To download a multi-page document as a PDF, click the blue 'Download as PDF' button at the top right of the image viewer.

■ Glasgow YWCA celebrates its 140th anniversary in 2014 and has produced a booklet for a heritage trail: Y heritage trail central Glasgow: walk our route between former YWCA buildings and discover our history of supporting women in Glasgow. 16pp.

They have also produced a video about their history and present activities. The first half is particularly relevant to Glasgow's local and social history. Their services have adapted to the needs of the different eras: providing hostels, cheap food and employment services to late Victorian women; wartime support and assistance to women and families in the two world wars; present day education and support for immigrants and new arrivals to the city.
