

LIBRARIES, ARCHIVES & MUSEUMS

• Local History Week runs from 1-8 March 2014. Each year libraries in Scotland focus on a common theme in local history and build events around it. This year there was an embarrassment of riches of possible themes, with the anniversary of World War 1 and the Homecoming and Commonwealth Games. For example East Dunbartonshire has a varied range

EXHIBITIONS

 Cupar Heritage Centre will stage two special displays this year: the impact of the First World War and the 125th Anniversary of Bell Baxter School.

Guthrie Hutton writes:

Space in the Heritage Centre is tight, so to accommodate these displays, the semi-permanent **Story of Cupar** exhibit will be reduced, a difficult task compounded by the addition of two prison cell doors. Donated by Fife Council, the doors came from the recently demolished former Police Station. They are big and heavy, but are a good way to illustrate the importance of law to Cupar.

Other artefacts that will have to be shown are a time capsule and contents. Buried in 1897, the capsule was unearthed late last year, when the town's Mercat Cross was moved to make way for road improvements. These and other additions mean that the Heritage Centre, which is situated in an old staff cottage at Cupar Station, is starting to overflow. The station staff and First ScotRail have been very helpful in identifying storage space and it is hoped to get access to this shortly.

Although not yet fixed, this year's opening times are likely to be similar to last year when the centre opened in mid April, Wednesdays 2.00pm – 4.30pm, Saturdays 10.00am – 1.00pm and Sundays 2.00 – 4.30pm. Details will be confirmed on the website: www.cuparheritage.org

• *The Family at War*. To commemorate the anniversary of World War I, **Blair Castle** will present

a display from their collections of the contribution made by the 7th Duke and his family to the war effort. 1 April-31 October.

Visit to TRINITY HOUSE OF LEITH and the SHORE Friday 2 May 2014

Tucked behind a tired shopping centre at the foot of Leith Walk is a small architectural gem - Trinity House of Leith. Although the origins of the Incorporation of Masters and Mariners date back to 1380, the present building was built in 1816 and came under the care of Historic Scotland in 2001.



Upstairs the grand Convening Room offers a spectacular plaster ceiling and a fascinating collection of artefacts, navigation instruments, paintings and maritime memorabilia donated by Trinity House members over the centuries.

As well as the opportunity to tour the building, there will also be a talk on the Leith smacks and an informal local history walk around old Leith. If you do not wish to walk, you may join the visit for the afternoon only.

Places are limited so do book early.

PROGRAMME

MORNING

10.30 As Trinity House does not have catering facilities, and has limited toilets, we shall meet for coffee and refreshments at a restaurant nearby - not included in price.

Walking tour for just over an hour, around old Leith, now an attractive and vibrant area, which has undergone considerable renovation over the last few vears.

Lunch break for about an hour at the Shore beside the Water of Leith. There are many different eating places offering varied lunches from snacks to restaurant meals. Lunch is not included in the price.

AFTERNOON

Tour of Trinity House and collections, led by Historic Scotland staff.

Talk by Eric Graham: The Legendary Leith Smacks, c.1800-1860.

We aim to finish about 15.30 -16.00.

This timetable is approximate – timings will depend on the number of participants. Final arrangements (including map and information about parking and buses) will be circulated with your confirmation.

However it may be useful to know, when planning your journey to Edinburgh by public transport, that buses take about 15 minutes from east end of Princes Street - near Waverley Station (22) or York Place - near Bus Station (16) and both have 6 services per hour.
